## Part IV : Description of Events

On May 25, 2020, George Floyd tragically died in Minneapolis, Minnesota, shortly following his arrest in which an officer of the Minneapolis Police Department knelt on his neck to detain him during the arrest, and then did not respond to Mr. Floyd's requests for help when he stated that he could not breathe. On May 29, 2020 and May 30, 2020, there were peaceful protests in the City of San Jose; however, additional civil unrest ensued, including looting and rioting, in the downtown area of San José that resulted in arrests, injuries, fires, and significant property damage. The San José Police Department anticipated looting and rioting to continue and to expand beyond the downtown area of San José. On May 31, 2020, the City Director of Emergency Services declared the existence of a local emergency. This initial damage estimate represents the period May 29, 2020 to June 13, 2020, for emergency protective measures, including police and emergency personnel services, facilities cleaning, graffiti removal and building repair, and street sweeping and cleaning. This initial damage estimate does not include extensive private property or business damage that occurred during this time. Category A: Approximately seven (7) streets were swept and cleaned, with approximately six (6) cubic yards of debris removed. Category B: There were 816 San José Police Dept and Sherriff Staff managing crowd control, with 7 San José Fire Dept personnel supporting emergency services, and four (4) other City personnel providing general support services. Category E: City Hall, City 4th Street Garage, City Employee Garage, Fire Training Center, Animal Care Services facility and a City Parks structure were damaged, included graffiti and trash removal, damaged equipment (burned litter cans and broken windows).
